At the same time, repeated declarations of states of emergency in countries such as Haiti, Trinidad, and Jamaica signal deepening political instability and social unrest. We are also grieving the loss of a generation of scholars and writers whose contributions have profoundly shaped Caribbean literary and cultural studies.

We have convened this conference to explore, in a meaningful way, how contemporary writers are engaging with these urgent times. Our novelists, poets, essayists, visual artists, and musicians continue to offer invaluable insights and perspectives that can guide us through these challenges, just as they have always done.

Finally, we thank each of you for responding to our invitation and for recognizing the importance of reflecting on the implications of these urgent times for our circum-Caribbean region. It is an honor to have you all here as interlocutors, and we eagerly anticipate the next four days of rich and engaging conversation.

Futurism and Beyond is Caribbean tripartite a combination of interviews with writers of the sf (speculative fiction, science fiction, fantasy, and folklore) genre, literary and cultural analysis of those interviews within the context of seven discrete yet overlapping dimensions - folklore, mythology, children's and young adult literature, science, technology, climate disaster, and identity; and a theory of Caribbean futurism as an esthetic practice reflecting not just future but also past and present experiences of Caribbean people. Interviews include Nalo Hopkinson, Karen Lord, Tobias Buckell, and Diana McCaulay

The tripartite structure of Caribbean Futurism and Beyond








Critical Dialogues in Caribbean Literature

Inside Tenement Time (Kezia Page, Colgate University) is the first comprehensive treatment of literary and cultural texts on surveillance in the Caribbean. Covering the long historical arc of the twentieth to the twenty-first centuries, Inside Tenement Time uses Jamaica as a case study to examine moments of crisis and particular spaces, especially urban yard enclaves and their environs, in the Caribbean encounter with surveillance. Making the argument that the Caribbean situation reveals flexible hegemonies rather than provinces of exclusive control, the book demonstrates the countervailing force of sussveillance and spiritveillance, Afrovariations on surveillance. Sussveillance spiritveillance are exemplars of vernacular arts and sciences that operate at and within the frangible borders of state power, exposing the unique dynamics of surveillance in the region and marshalling the acts of imagination with which it contends.

In Strolling in the Ruins, Faith Smith (Brandeis University) engages with a period in the history of the Anglophone Caribbean often overlooked as nondescript, quiet, and embarrassingly pro-imperial within the larger narrative of Jamaican and Trinidadian nationalism. Between the 1865 Morant Bay Rebellion and World War I, British imperialism was taken for granted among both elites and ordinary people, while nationalist discourses would not begin to shape political imagination in the West Indies for decades. Smith argues that this moment, far from being uneventful, disrupts the inevitability of nationhood in the mid-twentieth century and anticipates the Caribbean's present-day relationship to global power.
